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I. INTRODUCTION

The SEAFDEC Training Department has conducted regional training programs for fishery extension officers, with assistance from the Royal Netherlands Government under the Netherlands the Programme for Studies in the Region (SIR/DSO), since 1981. Eleven training courses, with a total of 269 participants from ten countries in South and Southeast Asian regions and Africa, have been organized by the Department between 1981 and 1990.

Under its program for 1991, the Training Department organized an International Training Course for Fishery Extension Officers from 5 November to 18 December 1991. The emphasis of this course was placed on extension methodology and the socio-economics of small-scale fisheries, subjects which are of great importance to the countries in Asia and Africa.

Invitations to nominate participants were sent to thirteen countries, i.e. Bangladesh, Egypt, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Maldives, Pakistan, the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Tanzania, Thailand and Yemen. Nine countries responded and the participants were as follows:

II. OBJECTIVES:

The objectives of the International Training Course for fishery extension officers are:

1. To train fishery officers and extension workers in improving their skills and techniques in extension methodology and socio-economic surveying of fishing communities and basic knowledge of fishery cooperatives.
2. To familiarize the participants with the techniques for communication media design and development.
3. To provide study/observation trips for participants to familiarize themselves with small-scale fishing communities and with other places related to media design and production.

IV. TRAINING PROGRAM

1. Lectures, Discussion and Practical Experience

Training was carried out with all facilities and resources of the Department fully utilized. The regular sessions usually began at 0900 hrs. on weekdays with classroom lectures and discussions taking place until 1630 hrs. Lectures on theoretical subjects were occasionally followed by practical experience. Some special sessions were also held after working hours and at weekends.

2. Field Survey Practice

Four days practice in socio-economic surveying of fishing communities was carried out to train participants in the collection of data relating to the socio-economic status of small-scale fishermen.

The participants left SEAFDEC/TD on 22 November 1991, and visited Ang-sila Fishing Village and Fishermen's Group in Chonburi. After that they took part in the interviewing of fishermen in the Rayong Province fishing communities of Ta-pong, Khon-Ao and Ao Makham Pom, until 25 November 1991. Other relevant places visited included the Marine Science Institute, an oyster farm and fishing ports. Participants returned to SEAFDEC/TD at 2200 hrs. on 25 November 1991.

3. Study and Observation Trips

Various extension service institutions in Bangkok and its environs were visited:

27 November 1991 : 1000-1600 Visited Kampong Saen National Agricultural Extension Training Center in Nakorn Pathom Province. The participants attended lectures on the activities of extension and training programs conducted by the Center. Participants also saw its audio-visual section and printing shop.

28 November 1991 : 0545-1100 Visited the Fish Marketing Organization (FMO) in Bangkok. A briefing on the organization's activities was given by the Bangkok Fish Market's manager, who kindly took participants around to observe the fish landing and auction system.

: 1330-1600 Visited the Educational Television Station Channel 11 (of Thailand), for a tour of studios and control rooms and to observe the activities of the station.

- 29 November 1991 : 0800-1130 Visited the Agricultural Extension Department. Participants attended a brief on the activities of agricultural extension services in Thailand and observed all the functions of the department.
- : 1300-1600 Visited the Sukhothai-thammathirat Open University to observe the media production department studio, control rooms, radio sound recording rooms and printing shop.

V. EVALUATION

For the final evaluation of the course most of the participants completed a questionnaire. The majority were satisfied with the present training arrangements. The results of this questionnaire are shown in Annex D.

Although the participants agreed that the course met their expectations and was very beneficial to their extension work, they felt that more time should be allocated to practical work. They also suggested that more time be devoted to fishing community survey practice and extension methods.

In view of the other comments and suggestions received, some slight modification in living conditions at the SEAFDEC/TD dormitory, especially regarding accommodation and food should be considered. Comments were noted and will be taken into consideration for future courses.

VI. CLOSING CEREMONY

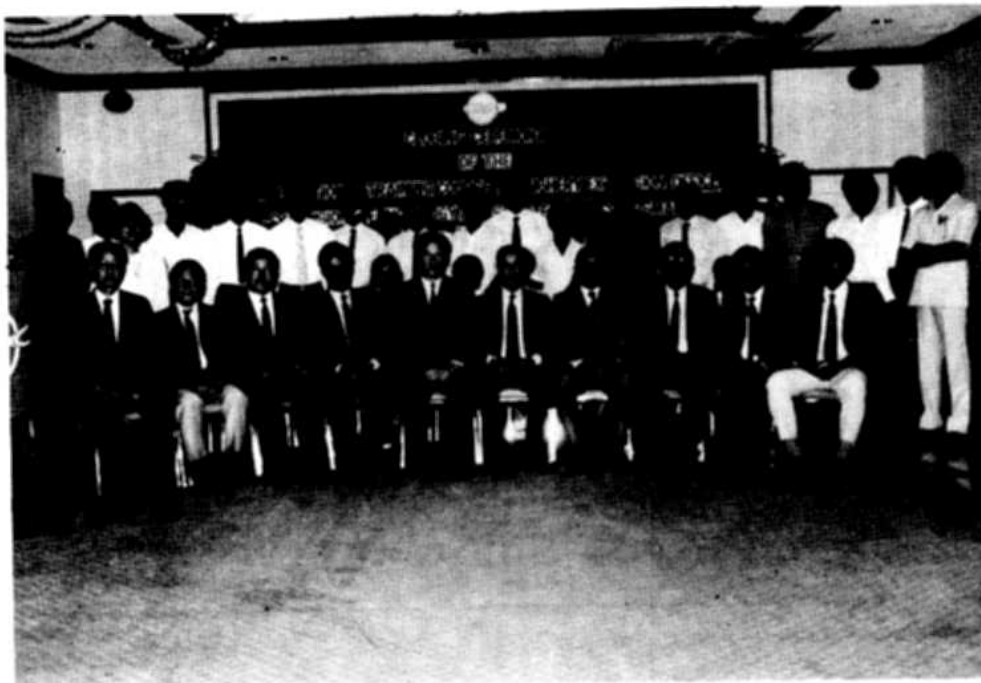
