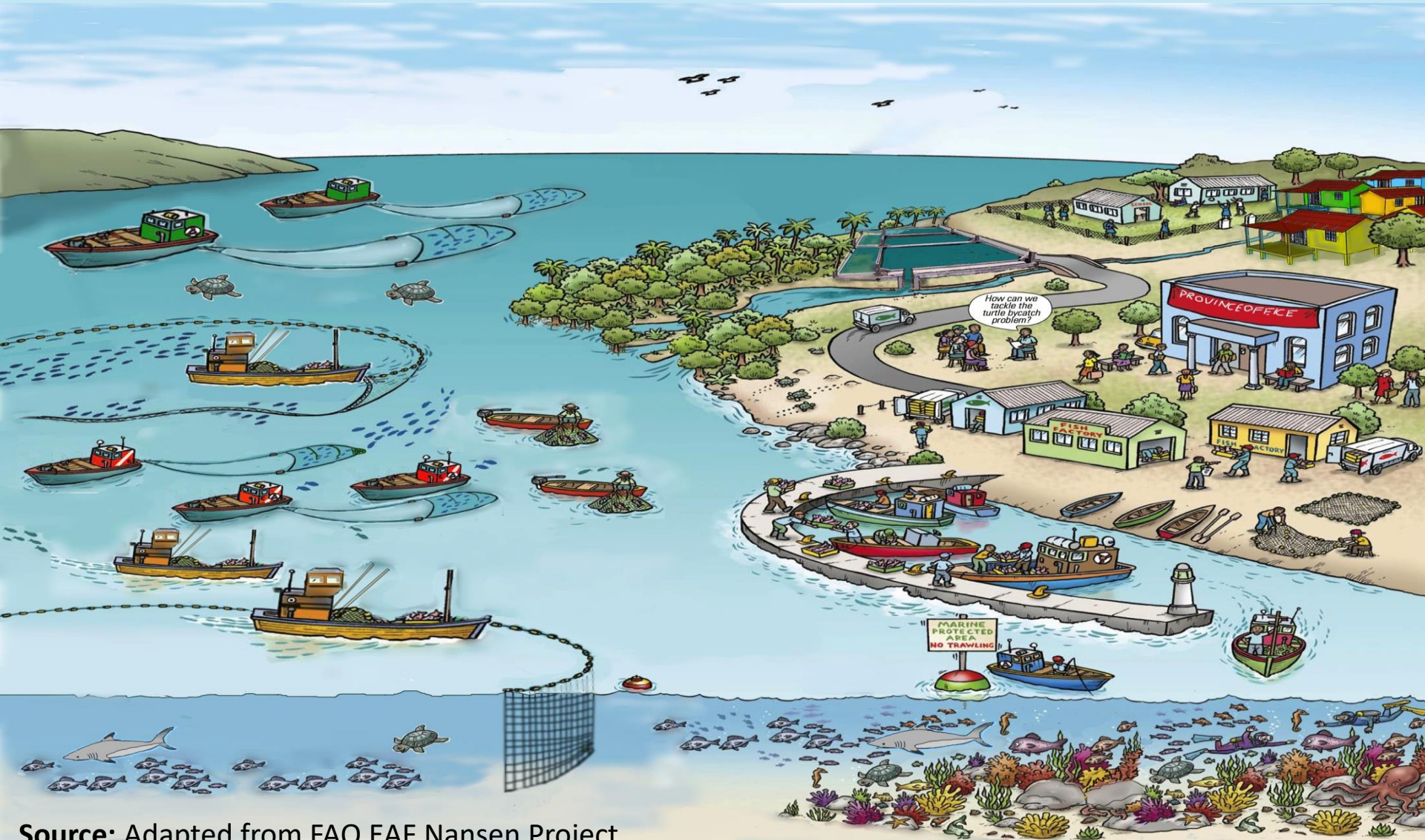
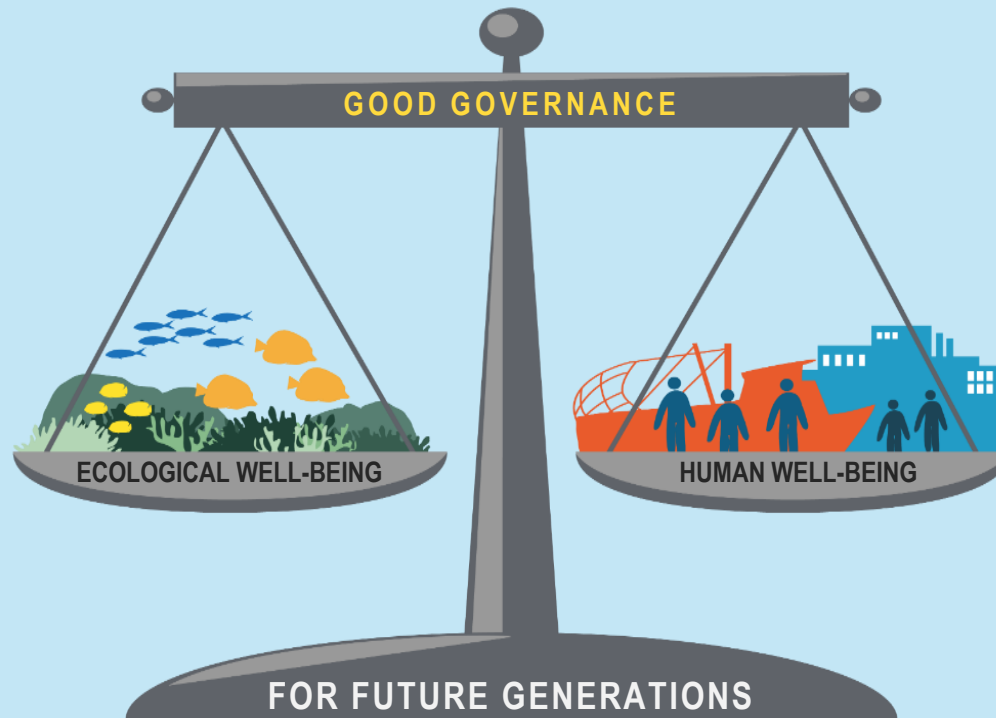

5. Cooperation & coordination

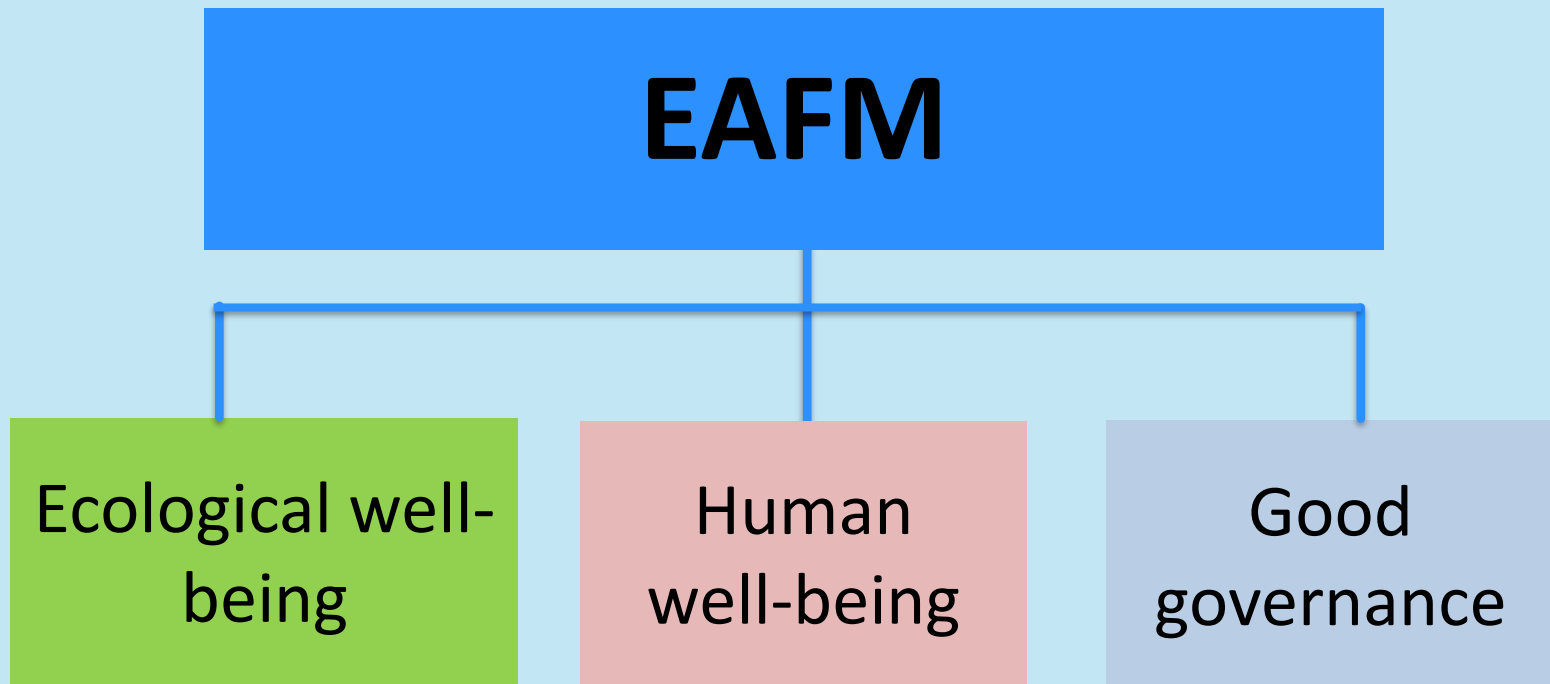

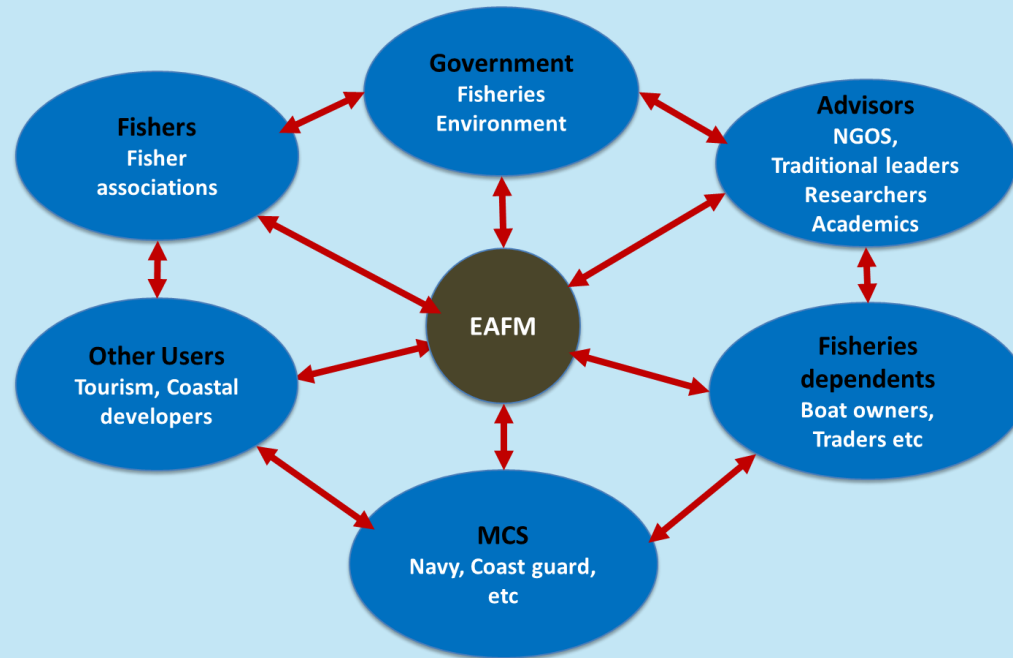

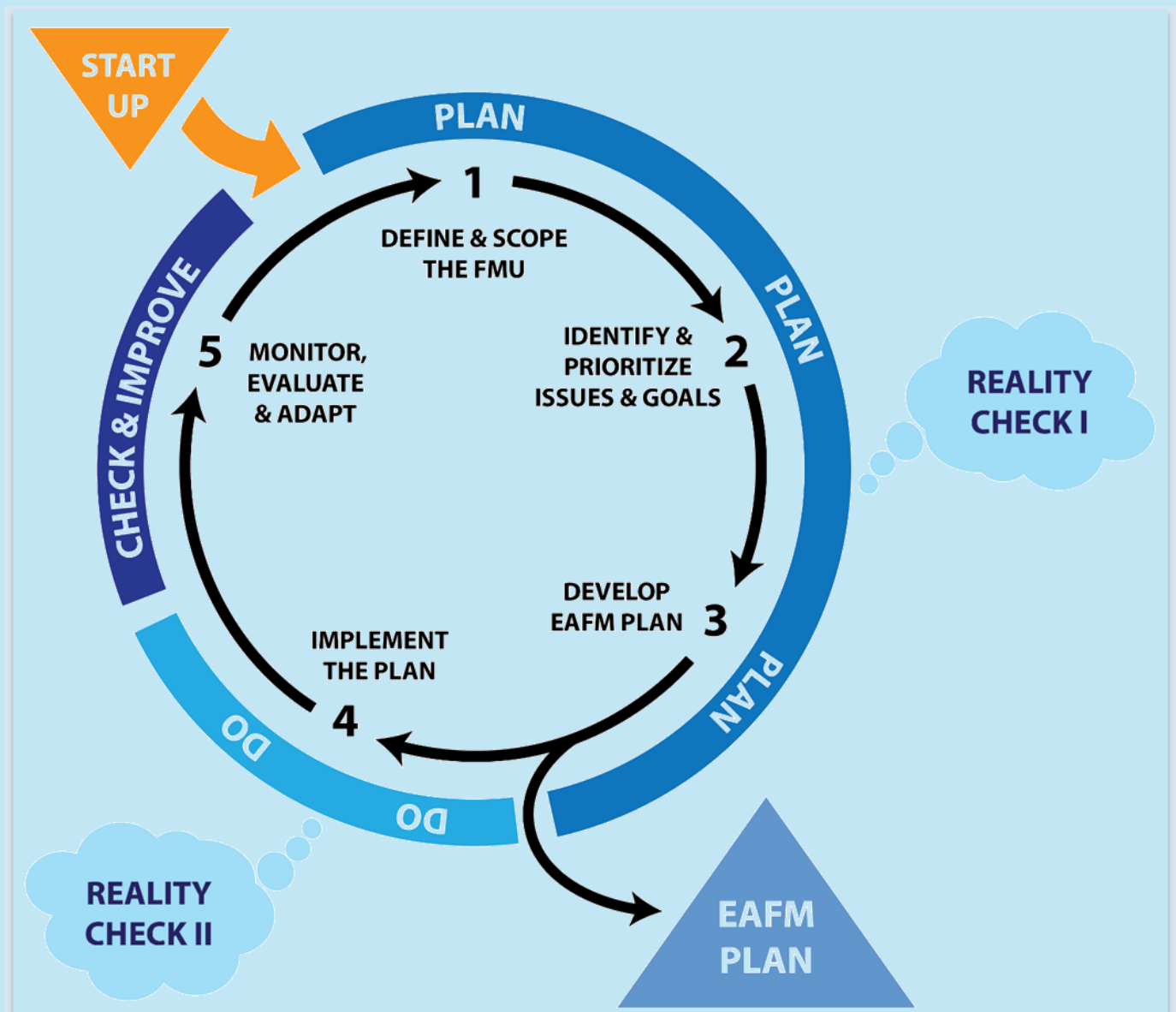
