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I. INTRODUCTION

The primary aim of fisheries extension is to assist the depressed groups of small-scale fisherfolks. One way of doing this is to strengthen the extension service systems which are designed to transfer technology to the fishermen and also to raise their socio-economic status and living conditions. It is evident that at present most extension service systems are inadequate and need to be improved.

In order to upgrade the extension service systems at regional level, several problems have to be overcome. One such problem is that officers employed for this task lack the skills to communicate, disseminate and demonstrate the necessary information. This situation would be improved if training on communication and dissemination techniques, and extension methodology were given.

The Training Department of the Southeast Asian Fisheries Development Center has conducted regional training programs for fishery extension officers with the assistance of the Royal Netherlands Government under the DSO program since 1981. The training programs have so far produced some 324 trained personnel efficient in fishery extension methodology from twelve different countries in South and Southeast Asia and Africa.

For this year of 1994, TD organized an international training course for fishery extension officers from 26 October to 9 December 1994 with particular emphasis on coastal resources management. The over-exploitation of coastal resources and damaging effects of certain fishery practices underline the importance of this subject. Inevitably, the alleviation of the consequences of such practices will require a multi-disciplinary program dealing with socio-economic, legislative, political, biological and environmental awareness. This training course aims to teach trainees the skills necessary to organize and manage the grassroots organizations which will be capable of carrying out marine fishery extension programs and tackling resources problems from the bottom up.

Invitations for the nomination of participants were sent to Fourteenth Countries: Bangladesh, Brunei, Cambodia, Egypt, India, Malaysia, the Maldives, Myanmar, Pakistan, the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Tanzania, Thailand and Vietnam. Nine Countries responded and the eventual number of participants were as follows:

The objectives of this training course are:

1. To enable trainees to improve their skills in organizing and managing grassroots organizations which will finally support other public agencies in the promotion of coastal resources management;
2. To refamiliarize trainees with communication techniques, especially the use of modern electronic equipment to produce audio-visual aids, and their deployment in the field;
3. To provide trainees with an opportunity to practice their skills in real situations of fishing communities.

IV. TRAINING PROGRAMS

1. Lectures, Discussion and Practical Experience

Training was carried out with all facilities and resources of the Department fully utilized. The regular sessions usually started at 0900 hrs. on weekdays with classroom lectures and discussion which will take place until 1630 hrs. Lectures on theoretical subjects were occasionally followed by practical experience. Some special sessions were also held after working hours and at weekends.

2. Fishing Communities Survey Practice

Four-day practice in baseline surveying of fishing community was conducted in order to train participants in the collection of data relating to the living conditions and socio-economic status of small-scale fishermen.

The participants paid a visit to Bangsarei Fishing village and its Fishermen's Group in Chonburi on 16 November 1994. After that they took part in the interviewing session with fishermen in Koh Perd Fishing Community in Chantaburi until 19 November 1994. Other relevant places visited included the Marine Science Institute of Burapa University and Tha Mai Shrimp Farm. Participants returned to SEAFDEC/TD at 2000 hrs. on 19 November 1994.

3. Study and Observation Trips

Various fishery and extension service institutions in Bangkok and its environs were visited:

10 November 1994 : 0830-1600 Visited Mae Klong Fishery Cooperatives. The participants were briefed on the activities of the Cooperatives by Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the Cooperatives. After that they were give lecture

on Fishery Cooperatives in Thailand by Officers from Cooperatives Promotion Department. Participants also observed some of the ship-yards and fishing ports near the cooperatives.

24 November 1994 : 0700-1100 Visited the Fish Marketing Organization. Briefing on the organization's activities was given by the Public Relations Officers who kindly took participants around to observe the fish landing and auction system.

: 1300-1600 Visited the Educational Television Station Channel 11 (of Thailand), for observation of studios and control rooms as well as for a brief on activities of the station.

25 November 1994 : 0800-1130 Visited Fisheries Extension Division, Department of Fisheries. Participants were briefed on the activities of the fisheries extension services in Thailand and were taken around to observe all facilities of the division.

: 1300-1600 Visited the Sukhothai Thammathirat Open University to observe the Media Production Department Studios, control rooms, radio sound recording rooms, computer-based instruction unit and printing department.

V. EVALUATION

A final evaluation of the course was made by all participants who mostly agreed that the course met their expectations and was very beneficial to their extension work. They felt that more time should be allocated to practical work. They also suggested that more time be devoted to base line survey practice in fishing communities, extension methods and communication media design and development. Comments were noted and will be taken into consideration for future improvement of the course.

VI. CLOSING CEREMONY

The closing ceremony of the International Training Course for Fishery Extension Officers was organized by the Training Department at the Asia Hotel in Bangkok on 9 December 1994. The ceremony was presided over by the Counsellor of the Royal Netherlands to Thailand, Mr. Michiel W.H. Crom.

VII. CONCLUSION

In general, it can be considered that all the objectives of the training course were achieved. All participants completed and were satisfied with their six-week stay and training at the SEAFDEC Training Department. They also agreed that the course had provided valuable and beneficial knowledge applicable to their jobs in extension services.
